Tyger River Campus - Duncan, SC



Empowering Dreams with Full-Tuition Scholarships

Live to Chase (2024-2025)

For the 2024–2025 academic year, Spartanburg Community College reaffirmed its commitment to accessibility through the 'Live to Chase' initiative. This initiative offers full tuition scholarships for more than 90 credit-bearing certificate and degree programs, ensuring that higher education is within reach for all eligible Chasers.

Extending the 'Live to Chase' initiative underscores SCC's commitment to both affordability and community impact. "This initiative provides South Carolina residents with a high-quality education free from the burden of tuition," said Dr. Michael Mikota.

By removing tuition barriers, SCC strengthens educational access across Spartanburg, Cherokee, and Union counties. Ultimately, SCC continues to make decisions that support regional economic development and workforce readiness.







WHAT DOES IT COVER?

- Tuition for SCC academic (credit) programs is covered, provided that all eligibility requirements are met.
- Any remaining tuition balance, after applying all financial aid grants and scholarships awarded to the student, is also covered.
- This coverage does not include books, supplies, fees, living expenses, or other non-tuition costs. Students are responsible for any program-specific fees, including but not limited to: distance learning or hybrid course fees, lab fees, and other non-academic assessed fees.

WHO QUALIFIES?

- All college-eligible students who either live or work full-time in South Carolina and enroll in a minimum of six credit hours in one of SCC's more than 90 programs that lead to the awarding of either a certificate or degree may qualify for a full tuition scholarship.
- Students must maintain continuous enrollment (fall-spring) and a minimum 2.2 GPA.
- Full tuition scholarships do not cover developmental courses after 30 or more attempted hours.





Fall 2024 Student Body Demographics



Daiquan Smith, a proud native of Hampton, South Carolina, graduated with honors in the Class of 2025 from Spartanburg Community College's highly respected Culinary Arts program. Throughout his time at SCC, Daiquan distinguished himself not only through academic excellence but also through his passion for culinary innovation and dedication to his craft. In recognition of his achievements and leadership, he was selected as one of two student speakers at this year's graduation ceremony, where he inspired his peers and the wider college community with his story of perseverance and success.

Before finding his path at SCC, Daiquan's academic journey was marked by uncertainty. "I attended several schools thinking I'd become a teacher, but I eventually questioned if college was even for me," he shared. It was his grandmother's resilience and support that gave him the strength to try again, and SCC's 'Live to Chase' initiative that made it possible. "I chose SCC because it didn't just offer a degree; it gave me the opportunity to dream big."

Balancing work, financial hardship, and transportation issues, Daiquan faced significant challenges on his road to success. "I was working multiple jobs. At one point, I didn't have a car or enough money to make ends meet. There were changes in my health and finances, but I kept going," he said.

SCC helped him turn that persistence into progress. "With the 'Live to Chase' initiative, I earned a degree in a field I've always had a passion for. SCC gave me the tools to honor my grandmother by building a business where I can share good food with the world."

Now living in Spartanburg with his wife, Dr. Janell Smith, Daiquan is focused on growing his catering business—Betty's Boi Kitchen LLC—inspired by his late grandmother and grounded in a passion for food and family legacy.

To future students, his advice is bold and sincere: "Go for it. Dream big. Live out loud. Trust the process. Choosing SCC isn't just a smart move—it's a chance to live while chasing your dreams."

"I didn't know what to do or if I had to put my career on hold," Bridget shared. "I reached out to some awesome staff members at SCC for help, and they helped me." That support provided more than financial relief—it gave her the strength and stability to stay on track in school while caring for two small children.

It feels good to know that we have people in our corner doing everything to help us succeed. That means a lot because it takes a village, and some people don't have anybody to turn to, like me. Today, Bridget is entering her second semester in the Nursing Program. Thanks to the generosity of donors, her journey continues—not only as a student and caregiver but as a future healthcare professional determined to succeed.

Impact Story Cybersecurity and Networking, Class of 2024 Culinary Arts, Class of 2020



From a challenging past marked by adversity, trauma, and uncertainty, to a hopeful future built on resilience, faith, and determination, Tasha Marshall's journey stands as a powerful testament to the transformative and life-changing impact of Spartanburg Community College.

Tasha came to SCC from a background of deep personal trauma, abuse, and instability. "By the time I was 16, I was out of the house and taking care of myself," she shared. "I had no guidance, no sense of how to live life." For years, she had given up on her dreams—until the moment she found strength in her faith and a renewed vision for her future. That vision led her to SCC.

"I came to SCC afraid, unsure, and still healing," Tasha said. "But from the moment I walked through the doors, I experienced something I never had before—family, support, and love."

Through SCC, Tasha found more than just an education. She discovered a supportive community and professors who not only encouraged her but also challenged her to believe in herself and reach beyond what she thought was possible.

Tasha earned two associate degrees from SCC and is now working toward her bachelor's degree in computer science. She no longer struggles with the anxiety and fear that once held her back—and she credits SCC with helping her grow into the confident woman she is today.

Today, Tasha's daughter is enrolled in SCC's Dual Enrollment program. "She's going to experience what I did—the love and empowerment inside those walls," Tasha said. "It makes me so proud to give her the life I once only dreamed about."

She remains deeply connected to the College and its mission. "SCC didn't just educate me—it healed me. It restored me. It gave me a future. And I will pour back into that community for the rest of my life."

Hurricane Helene









In September 2024, Hurricane Helene swept through the Carolinas, leaving a path of destruction that disrupted power, damaged homes, and displaced daily life for thousands. For many Spartanburg Community College students and employees, the storm threatened far more than just their academics—it jeopardized their basic needs, their stability, and their sense of security.

Although the College was closed from September 30, 2024, through October 7, 2024, its commitment to students and the community never wavered. SCC employees, along with the entire South Carolina community, came together to respond to urgent needs across the Carolinas.

SCC's Campus Police and Marketing Departments, led by Dr. Mikota, partnered with Blue Ridge Community College to collect and distribute supplies such as food, water, toiletries, diapers, generators, washing machines, and clothing to affected communities in Western North Carolina. Several SCC campuses acted as distribution points for MREs and bottled water, ensuring access to basic needs for students and their families.

In the weeks following Hurricane Helene, SCC volunteers continued processing donations, connecting students to emergency aid, and providing a vital human connection during a time of uncertainty. SCC's response was more than logistical—it was deeply compassionate. It's a story of swift action and a college firmly rooted in the well-being of its students and the community it serves.

Impact Story Computer Technology, Class of 2012 Accounting, Class of 1987



This alumna, a stay-at-home mother looking to reenter the workforce, graduated from Spartanburg Technical College in June 1987 with an associate degree in Accounting. With her daughter becoming more independent, she felt it was time to pursue a career—and SCC provided the practical, affordable, and close-to-home opportunity she needed to do just that.

"When I graduated from Broome High School in 1984, I wasn't sure what path to take. I thought Accounting would be a smart move because it was marketable," she shared. After working part-time at her local elementary school, she enrolled at SCC. The transition wasn't always easy. "It was a challenge getting back in the driver's seat," she shared. "I worked part-time while attending classes, and it took me three years to complete a two-year program. But I got there."

During her time at SCC, she received encouragement and support from instructors who made a lasting impact. "Mrs. Lynn Dale, my accounting teacher, was nurturing and encouraging. Instructor Matt Alimaghan and IT Director Pete Gallen helped shape my second career. They truly cared about their students."

After graduation, she worked various jobs in the technology field and eventually returned to SCC in 2022, where she now serves as a dedicated employee. "I believe my education here gave me an edge over other applicants. Real-world experience is part of the learning mold used at SCC—it provides a clear transition into the workforce."

Her contributions to SCC continue to grow. What began with renewing 22 software licenses for the IT Department has expanded into managing 120 renewals across the entire college. In addition to her technical responsibilities, she volunteers at campus events and remains deeply committed to SCC's mission of service and community.

"Spartanburg Community College is a great place to trust with your education. Everyone is willing to help you succeed," she said.



Meeting Students Where They Are

Over the past year, Spartanburg Community College has made a bold investment in student success—one that's already transforming outcomes and lives. What began in Spring 2024 with just a single Success Coach has grown into a dynamic team of **eight**, including three Dual Enrollment Coaches stationed in local high schools and five based across SCC campuses.

The team uses real-time data, faculty alerts, and proactive outreach to identify students at risk, intervene early, and remove barriers to success. These coaches are transforming the student experience through personalized support, meaningful relationships, and a strong sense of community connection.

SCC's Success Coaches are more than advisors—they're advocates, problem-solvers, and champions for student perseverance, offering individualized guidance, hosting events and workshops, and walking alongside students every step of the way.

Coaches help students navigate academic and financial challenges, build essential skills, and stay on track to graduate. They also collaborate across departments to identify systemic barriers and develop targeted outreach—proving that real-time support can drive real results. For example, coaches discovered that many students were withdrawing due to unpaid balances.

In response, SCC implemented a system to flag at-risk students early and connect them with financial resources—before the issue escalates.

The team also monitors students on academic probation and suspension, developing personalized plans that promote both accountability and encouragement.

In addition to one-on-one coaching, SCC's Success Coaches host workshops that are vital to student engagement. These events support outreach, skill-building, and awareness of campus resources, while also fostering meaningful connections. Success Workshops cover a wide range of topics, including study strategies, time management, college preparation, social-emotional health, a sense of belonging, and overcoming failure.

Behind every number is a success story—like the dual-enrollment student in crisis who was identified and supported, the student who overcame several failing semesters before switching programs of study, or the high school student who stopped attending classes during a personal crisis but was re-engaged through targeted outreach. Thanks to SCC's strategic commitment, increased awareness, and coordinated resources, the College is redefining what student support looks like—helping students reset their academic paths and move forward with confidence.

Through workshops on time management, emotional wellness, study strategies, and building a sense of belonging, the Success Coaches are fostering a culture of resilience across campus. These events do more than offer academic tools—they help students form connections with one another, engage with vital campus resources, and envision a broader, brighter future.

Looking ahead, SCC's Success Coaching program serves as a model for what's possible when innovation, compassion, and strategy align. Every student interaction becomes a turning point—and together, these moments are building a more empowered, supported, and successful student body.





SCC's SOAR (Support, Opportunity, Achievement, and Retention) program provides short-term financial assistance to help students overcome final barriers on their path to graduation. Eligible students may receive tuition or balance support for one semester, along with up to \$250 per semester in book assistance until they complete their program.

To date, **41 students** have participated in SOAR, with **12 graduates**—three of whom completed their programs in Spring 2025.

Catelyn, for example, owed nearly \$500 for her final class but had no way to pay the balance. Thanks to her close relationship with her Success Coach, she felt comfortable seeking assistance. The team identified her as a SOAR candidate, covered the remaining balance, and Catelyn graduated with a 4.0 GPA.

The Spark Center is located along the I-85 corridor on Highway 290 in Duncan, at the SCC Tyger River Campus, a designated enterprise campus.

The Spark Center's Economic Impact

The Spark Center contributes significantly to job creation, earnings, and tax revenue for Spartanburg County and the state of South Carolina. The following data covers the period from July 1, 2023, to June 30, 2024, and also includes the long-term impact of The Spark Center since its opening in 2007. During the 2023–2024 period, nearly **3,000** net new jobs were created, generating total wage earnings of **\$202,111,002** in Spartanburg County. Over the past 17 years, The Spark Center has supported the development of more than **100,000** jobs, producing nearly **\$4.362** billion in total wage earnings.

Tax Impact of The Spark Center (In Spartanburg County)

Another important factor when measuring economic impact is how much revenue the state generates from income and sales taxes due to the new jobs created by The Spark Center. As people earn more, they pay more in income taxes, and they also tend to spend more, which increases sales tax revenue for the state. The following explains how the total earnings generated by The Spark Center (\$202,111,002), adjusted for benefits, translate into both income and sales taxes. This results in approximately \$7.7 million in income tax and \$3 million in sales tax, totaling more than \$10 million in new tax revenue for South Carolina.






In the 2024-2025 year, the department saw significant growth in employer engagement, with over **25** companies seeking customized training solutions—a testament to the strength of SCC's industry relationships and consultative approach. Programs are delivered in various formats, including in-person, online, and hybrid, accommodating adult learners and working professionals alike.







Customized Training & Revenue Impact

SCC's tailored workforce training programs have made a substantial impact across the region. This year, over **2,100** individuals participated in workforce development training—almost **800** through noncredit offerings and over **1,330** through customized training partnerships, including over **1,110** BMW employees. These efforts generated **\$1.57** million in revenue, reinforcing the College's role as a key player in regional workforce development.

Additionally, SCC leverages the South Carolina Workforce Industry Needs Scholarship (SC WINS) to eliminate financial barriers, providing tuition support for noncredit students. Looking forward, SCC aims to expand SC WINS utilization to cover essential program costs like uniforms and tools, further promoting accessibility and student success.



Fueling Spartanburg's Workforce

Spartanburg Community College (SCC) played a pivotal role in fostering community engagement and informed decision-making during the 2023 discussions surrounding the renewal of Spartanburg County's penny sales tax. This one-percent sales tax was set to expire in April 2024. To address this, SCC hosted a crucial public forum on October 30, 2023, at its Middle Tyger Campus. The event, titled "Voice of Business Brunch with MTAC – Penny Referendum," provided a platform for community members to learn about the proposed tax extension and its implications for local infrastructure.

SCC is proud to launch its new Heavy Equipment Program in August 2025—an initiative created in direct response to the Penny Tax to support Spartanburg County's expanding infrastructure projects. With **10** pieces of equipment donated by Spartanburg County, a brand-new track loader from Takeuchi, and a **\$200,000** grant from the Truist Foundation, SCC is investing in hands-on training that will prepare students for high-demand careers in construction and public works.

This powerful collaboration exemplifies SCC's unwavering commitment to driving economic growth and workforce readiness across our region. We're proud to lead the way in shaping a stronger, more skilled future for Spartanburg County.

SCC & NSF Partner to BOOST Advanced Manufacturing Workforce Development

Spartanburg Community College (SCC) is proud to be a key partner in BOOST (Building Opportunities for Outstanding Skills Training), a regional collaboration funded by the National Science Foundation (NSF). This initiative strengthens the capacity of Southeastern community colleges to meet the growing workforce needs of the advanced manufacturing sector.

Through NSF support, SCC is enhancing its ability to align education with industry demands—ensuring students are prepared for high-wage, high-demand careers while supporting economic growth in Upstate South Carolina.

Why Does This Matter for SCC?

- Manufacturing is the largest and fastest-growing industry in SCC's service area, employing over
 44,000 people—more than triple the national average.
- From 2012 to 2022, manufacturing's economic impact in SCC's region nearly doubled, reaching **\$7.9 billion**.
- Despite these opportunities, SCC faces challenges in scaling industry partnerships due to limited staff capacity, a lack of formal training in partnership-building, and disconnected program data systems.

SCC's NSF-Backed BOOST Initiatives

Thanks to NSF funding, SCC is addressing these challenges through strategic initiatives that directly benefit students, industry partners, and the local economy:

Director of Industry Partnerships

A new, dedicated role has been created to build and sustain relationships with manufacturing businesses, aligning programs with workforce needs.

Faculty & Staff Professional Development

NSF-supported training equips SCC faculty and staff with the skills to engage effectively with industry leaders and develop workforce-aligned curricula.

Data Integration for Informed Decision-Making

We are merging credit and noncredit program data into SCC's EAB Edify system to support agile, data-driven responses to industry needs.

SCC's Role in the BOOST Collaborative

As part of the NSF-funded BOOST cohort, SCC shares its expertise in:

- Economic development research through its Office of Research and Development.
- Innovative industry engagement strategies, such as The Spark Center, which has generated over **\$50 billion** in economic impact for South Carolina.

These best practices will be shared with other BOOST institutions, amplifying SCC's regional leadership and reinforcing its commitment to economic development.

SCC Wins Big with Student Success Grants

Title III Strengthening Institutions Program (SIP) Grant

In October 2024, Spartanburg Community College was awarded a highly competitive Title III Strengthening Institutions Program (SIP) grant from the U.S. Department of Education. This **\$2.1 million** investment, distributed over five years, will significantly enhance SCC's capacity to support and expand student success initiatives. Notably, SCC is one of only two colleges in South Carolina selected for this prestigious national award.

With a remarkable **62%** increase in enrollment since 2019, SCC continues to open doors for more Upstate South Carolinians, guiding them toward graduation and meaningful careers. The Title III grant supports improvements in academic quality, institutional management, and fiscal stability, and has also enabled the College to fund several key staff positions dedicated to student success.

SAM (Spartanburg Academic Movement) Grant

The SAM grant was implemented to boost post-secondary success rates. With a combined \$1.38 million awarded over two years, the grant is helping SCC transform key student pathways to build the economy and support economic mobility for students across Spartanburg County. The grant is a part of the Movement 2030 initiative—a community-driven plan that aims to advance educational and economic outcomes for the people in Spartanburg County.

Expanding & Enhancing Dual Enrollment Access

SCC is committed to ensuring that dual enrollment opportunities are accessible, affordable, and high-quality. Over the past year, the College has made measurable progress in building capacity and strengthening student support:

- Four Dual Enrollment Support Coaches were hired in Spring 2024 to provide personalized guidance.
- New efforts launched in Fall 2024 focused on expanding instructional capacity and increasing outreach to students with lower participation rates.

Boosting Degree Completion Through Institutional Supports

To ensure that more students enroll and complete their degree, SCC is investing in comprehensive support systems tailored to student needs:

- A reverse transfer agreement with USC
 Upstate has been implemented, enabling
 students to complete associate degrees
 using credits earned after transferring.
- SCC has begun deploying student gap funding to assist those at risk of dropping out due to financial challenges.
- In Fall 2024, SCC launched a suite of completion support initiatives, which may include academic advisors, success coaches, tutoring, emergency aid, faculty development, and student engagement software. These initiatives will be assessed for scalability beyond 2025.

Tailoring the College Experience for Adult Learners

Recognizing the importance of serving working adults and nontraditional students, SCC is using SAM Grant funds to expand outreach and reduce financial barriers for adults seeking to complete degrees:

- Targeted outreach to adult learners began in Spring 2024 to reengage individuals with some college but no credential.
- Gap funding is also available to adult students at risk of stopping out, helping them persist through to completion.



Dual Enrollment at SCC

SCC's Dual Enrollment program empowers high school students to begin their college journey early and tuition-free by earning college credits while still enrolled in high school. This streamlined pathway supports academic advancement, cost savings, and a direct transition to full-time college study upon high school graduation.

Key Features

Flexible Learning Formats

Students can take courses in person, online, or in a hybrid format and benefit from SCC's library, tutoring and testing centers, Student Hub, and other support services.

High School and SCC Instruction

Courses are taught by qualified instructors, offering both convenience and academic rigor.

Career-Focused Pathways

SCC partners with area career centers to provide engaging dual enrollment opportunities in fields like welding, mechatronics, and health sciences.

Benefits

Accelerated Credit Accumulation

Starting early means more earned credits and a smoother transition to college or career training post-graduation.

Cost Savings

As part of SCC's portfolio of tuition-free initiatives, dual enrollment provides a no-cost pathway toward a college degree.



Students interested in dual enrollment should begin by discussing their eligibility with their high school advisor or by contacting the SCC Dual Enrollment Office. Once ready to apply, students must create a personal email account, select "High School Dual Enrollment," and complete the online application, including submitting all required documentation such as transcripts and test scores. After acceptance is confirmed by SCC's Dual Enrollment Office, students will receive academic advising and proceed with course registration.



TEACHSpartanburg

Spartanburg Community College, Spartanburg School District 3, and USC Upstate have joined forces to create something new and exciting: the TEACHSpartanburg program. This partnership is designed to help students in high school start their journey to becoming teachers—right here in their own community. TEACHSpartanburg is the first program of its kind in the county.

Students who join the TEACHSpartanburg program begin taking classes with SCC while still in high school. After graduation, they continue at SCC to complete their associate degree, then transfer to USC Upstate to earn a bachelor's degree in education. Most students in the program can complete both degrees within just two years after high school graduation—allowing them to become teachers faster and with a clear, structured plan in place.

But the program isn't just about earning degrees. TEACHSpartanburg gives students real experience by providing them with time in real classrooms in District 3 schools. They'll work with experienced teachers, learn how to lead a class, and get hands-on practice while student teaching. They'll also take part in special mentoring sessions and professional development activities to help them grow into strong, confident educators.

This is more than just a great opportunity for students—it's also a smart solution to a real challenge. Spartanburg County, like many places, needs more teachers. By creating a path for students to become teachers in their own community, TEACHSpartanburg helps solve that shortage. It's a way for District 3 to "grow their own" teachers—students who already know and care about the community and who want to give back by teaching future generations.

Impact Story Welding, Class of 1980



In the fall of 1980, a recent Spartanburg High School graduate enrolled at what was then Spartanburg Technical College. Alongside four close friends, he entered the Welding program with a clear goal: secure employment with Duke Power, then oversee pipeline construction at two new nuclear energy plants being built in the Upstate.

But as graduation approached, the outlook changed. Support for nuclear power projects declined, hiring was frozen, and one of the plants shut down completely. "This left us needing a plan for 'what's next," he recalled.

The College didn't hesitate. Through its network and job placement efforts, the group was offered positions at Daniels Construction. But for him, the opportunity meant long-term, out-of-state travel—something not feasible due to responsibilities at home. He was once again left at a crossroads.

Without hesitation, SCC was there to help.

"One of my Welding instructors, Conrad Allen—who had even worked with my father earlier in their careers—helped me register, get accepted and transfer to the University of South Carolina Spartanburg," he said. That next step eventually led to a long, successful career with Spartanburg Water System, where he served for 37 years.

In July 2019, nearly four decades after first enrolling, he returned to SCC—not as a student, but as the Director of Procurement. Today, almost six years later, he continues to serve the College in a part-time capacity, helping students chase their own futures with the same support and encouragement he once received.

"The school never let me down—even when local job prospects fell through. They helped me find, not only my next step, but a career and a calling. Once a Chaser, always a Chaser."
