LIFE Scholarship

Information:

I graduated from a S.C. high school and have at least a 3.0 high school GPA. Am I eligible for LIFE?

- You may receive a LIFE Scholarship if all other eligibility criteria are met.
- You must have a calculation date between the date of graduation and no later than June 15.
- Detailed information about eligibility criteria can be found in "A Guide to Financial Aid, Veterans Affairs & Scholarships," which is available in the Spartanburg Community College's (SCC) financial aid office or on our website at: www.sccsc.edu/FinancialAid.

Why do students who are eligible for LIFE sometimes not receive it?

- To be admitted to SCC, you must take a skills assessment. Depending on your scores, you may need to take refresher courses in math, reading or English. These refresher courses are also referred to as "remedial" or "transitional" courses.
- You cannot use a LIFE Scholarship until you are enrolled in at least 12 non-remedial credit hours during a semester. Remedial courses are not covered by LIFE.
- If you need to take remedial courses, then your LIFE Scholarship can be deferred for up to one year.
- Zero level, 100 level and ESL 102 are considered remedial courses (MAT 031 and RDG 100 are examples.)
- If you need remediation, you should discuss all possibilities with your academic advisor. But, the financial aid office does not recommend taking 12 non-remedial credit hours at the same time that you are enrolled in remedial classes. You may negatively affect your ability to renew the LIFE Scholarship.

What are some other things that I need to know about LIFE?

- You may be eligible for other types of federal and state aid. Complete the FAFSA even though you are eligible for LIFE.
- You need to take a minimum of 12 non-remedial credit hours per semester to receive LIFE. But, to <u>renew</u> LIFE the following year, you must earn at least 30 non-remedial credit hours. Therefore, you may need to take additional credit hours during the fall and spring semesters or enroll during the summer semester.
- To <u>renew</u> LIFE the following year, you must earn a minimum 3.0 cumulative GPA in all non-remedial credit hour courses.
- Beginning Summer 2015, students enrolled in an Associate Degree program who have earned a minimum of 30 (non-remedial) credit hours and a 3.0 GPA by the end of the Spring semester may elect to use one of their remaining two terms of LIFE eligibility for Summer semester. NOTE: Students are required to be enrolled in at least 12 credit hours during the Summer term.
- You cannot receive LIFE and Lottery Tuition Assistance. If you receive LIFE during a fall or spring semester, you cannot receive Lottery Tuition Assistance during the following summer semester.
- You must submit your final, official high school transcript to the SCC admissions center before eligibility can be determined.
- If eligible, you must sign a certification form each year.
- Questions about eligibility should be addressed to the LIFE Scholarship coordinator in the financial aid office, especially questions related to renewal for the next year.

Information:

What is financial aid?

- Money that is available to students to help pay the cost of attending college.
- Grants and scholarships are funds that do not have to be repaid.
- Loans are borrowed money that must be repaid after the student leaves or graduates from school.
- Work-study is money that students earn by working a part-time job at SCC.

What financial aid programs are available at SCC?

When and how do I apply for financial aid?

To determine whether or not you are eligible for a federal financial aid program, S.C. Need Based Grant or Lottery Tuition Assistance, you and your family must complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).

- The FAFSA must be completed once per year between October and May for the following school year.
- The school year consists of the fall semester (begins in August), the spring semester (begins in January) and the following summer semester (begins in May).
- You and your parent (if dependent) should apply for a FSA ID and password prior to starting FAFSA for the first time. Go to https://fsaid.ed.gov to create the ID and password, and upon completion you may begin the FAFSA for the academic year of your choice.
- Complete the FAFSA at www.fafsa.gov. Simplify the process by using the IRS Data Retrieval Option when tax return data is requested.
- Complete your financial aid file before the May 1 priority deadline to be considered for all financial aid funds available.
- SCC's Title IV school code is 003994.

How does the process work?

- Complete the FAFSA and include SCC's Title IV school code, 003994.
- After submitting the FAFSA, you will receive a Student Aid Report (SAR), and SCC will receive your application data electronically, usually within 7-10 business days.
- If additional information is needed to complete your file, you will receive an email sent to your SCC email account. Items needed can be viewed through MySCC Portal in Student Self Service under "Financial Aid" and then "My Documents." Submit the requested information as soon as possible and make sure all documents are signed.
- Once your file is complete, you will receive an email sent to your SCC email account. You can view or print your financial aid award letter and all financial aid award letter inserts through MySCC Portal in Student Self Service under "Financial Aid."
- Read all information thoroughly. Important dates are listed so that you will know when your awards will be applied to your student account to be used toward tuition and fee charges and when you can go to the SCC Book Inn to make purchases using financial aid.

What is satisfactory academic progress?

- Students applying for and/or receiving financial aid through a federal program or S.C. Need Based Grant must be making satisfactory academic progress toward completion of a degree, diploma or certificate.
- This policy requires us to review the grades you earn <u>and</u> how many courses you have <u>attempted</u>.
- Understand this policy (explained in the SCC Catalog).

What if I transfer to another school?

- Financial aid awards do not transfer
- You must have the results of the FAFSA released to the new school so that your eligibility can be determined.

Do I have to be enrolled full-time to qualify for financial aid?

- No. However, most programs require that you be enrolled in at least 6 credit hours per semester.
- The original award notice is based on full-time status; however, aid will be reduced based on the actual number of credit hours in which you enroll.
- Remember that if you are not full-time, you do not pay as much for tuition and fees.
- Enrollment in at least 12 credit hours per semester is considered full-time. Three-quarter-time is enrollment in 9-11 credit hours. Half-time is enrollment in 6-8 credit hours. Less-than-half-time is enrollment in 1-5 credit hours.
- All the terms in a semester are combined to determine your enrollment status for that semester.

Communication with Students:

- MySCC Portal provides online services to SCC students such as student email accounts, campus announcements, message boards, calendars and discussion groups. Through Student Self Service in MySCC Portal, you may access personal records such as class schedules, grades, transcripts and financial aid information, as well as register for classes.
- The majority of communications from the SCC financial aid office will be sent to your SCC email account. You must review your email and announcements regularly through MySCC Portal to ensure you have the latest information about your financial aid status.
