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Since 1963, Spartanburg Community College (SCC) has educated and trained Spartanburg, Cherokee and Union counties residents by providing affordable access to high quality, accredited programs in a variety of fields. SCC's low tuition, small class sizes, dedicated instructors, flexible schedules and convenient locations make it an attractive choice for both traditional and non-traditional students.

By August 2013, SCC will become even more convenient for the residents of downtown Spartanburg, as it opens its newest location in the historic Evans Building on South Dean Street. Offering short-term job training and select associate degree programs, SCC's Downtown Campus will serve as an educational hub and a catalyst for further economic development in the downtown area.

SCC'S PROVEN IMPACT

SCC has made a significant economic impact in our local community. For every tax dollar spent on SCC, the state receives a cumulative return of \$1.60.*

- SCC saves the state approximately \$1.3 million per year in social-cost savings attributed to a reduction in crime, welfare, and unemployment, as well as improved individual health.*
- SCC is credited with contributing approximately \$108.4 million in average annual income that went back into SCC's service area of Spartanburg, Cherokee and Union counties.*

Broadening SCC's reach in downtown Spartanburg will also extend and concentrate these economic benefits in the local community.

The SCC Downtown Campus is an important piece of our downtown strategy and a tangible sign of opportunity for many. It will bring more people to the area and provide local residents access to the types of educational programs they need to find jobs. It is also a great match for local businesses who can offer their employees training that is convenient, which will also attract new businesses to downtown.

SHAPING THE FUTURE OF DOWNTOWN SPARTANBURG

Downtown Spartanburg has become the place to be - to live, work and play. With a variety of local shops, restaurants and parks, and its mix of historic landmarks and progressive cultural centers, the Hub City offers visitors and residents many fun and exciting things to do and see. Within the past decade, small and large businesses have located and prospered in the area, bringing revitalization that has improved the livelihood and economic outlook for the city.

However, there is still an unmet need in downtown Spartanburg – an overwhelming number of community residents are unemployed and live below the poverty line. Many do not have a high school diploma, so they are unemployable for most jobs. Some have outdated skills and need training for new jobs.

Community statistics point to a greater need for educational opportunities in this area, and

a proven strategy in fighting poverty and improving quality of life is education.

SCC will change these statistics with the new Downtown Campus by making a long-lasting impact to improve the socio-economic conditions that currently jeopardize downtown Spartanburg's chances of reaching its full potential.

By offering short-term job training and professional development programs, SCC's Downtown Campus will make education more accessible to the downtown's underserved population. As a result, local businesses will benefit from a growing, skilled, labor pool and the increased buying-power of higher household income levels, which will collectively contribute to stimulating the local economy. This future impact makes SCC a good investment for students and our community.

DOWNTOWN STATISTICS:

- 31% of the population living within a one-mile radius of the Evans Center fall below the poverty line. In some neighborhoods, this rate climbs to 60%.
- 46% of the households make less than \$25,000 a year.
- 27% of individuals age 18 and over do not have a high school diploma.

Renovating the Evans Building into the Evans Academic Center involves demolishing and reconfiguring the interior spaces and restoring original architectural and interior design features to their 1920's condition. It also requires bringing the stairwells, restrooms, fire protection and seismic requirements up to present building code compliance. All the windows, plumbing, electrical and HVAC systems will be replaced to qualify for LEED silver certification.

HISTORY IN THE MAKING

Built in 1921 for \$300,000, the Evans Building served as the center of Spartanburg's educational system for more than 50 years. The building opened its doors in 1922 as The Frank Evans High School, named in honor of the Spartanburg County school superintendent (1895-1934), who was known throughout the South as a leader in public education. The high school's enrollment increased rapidly within its first 6 years, requiring further additions and renovations, which resulted in the building as it stands today.

In 1928, the Evans Building became home to Spartanburg High School and was known for having the best facilities, equipment and educational opportunities in the state. This led to continuously increasing enrollment, and when the high school outgrew the facilities in 1959, it moved to its current location on Dupre Drive.

The building operated as Evans Junior High School until 1978 when it was sold to Spartanburg County. For over thirty years, the Evans Building has been used for a variety of County human services offices.

In 2013, for the first time in its educational history, the Evans Building will serve as the Evans Academic Center, a college and workforce development center. Spartanburg Community College purchased the building in 2011 and will restore it to its original grandeur and continue its legacy as a monumental school building, housing educational and training opportunities for area residents while fostering the revitalization of Downtown Spartanburg.

Arboretum: A place where trees, shrubs and herbaceous plants are cultivated for scientific and educational purposes.

The SCC Downtown Campus property is already serving this purpose, as it has been a case study for SCC's Urban Tree and Landscape Management classes. These faculty and students developed a plan to preserve sizeable Water Oak and Southern Magnolia specimens; remove trees that are hazardous or in a state of irreversible decline; and install redwoods, magnolias, maples, oaks, cypress, ginkgo and elm trees, as well as a variety of shrubs and groundcovers.



CREATING A DOWNTOWN ARBORETUM

SCC is an environmental steward, restoring building and grounds. As SCC revitalizes downtown's historic Evans Building into the College's new Downtown Campus and Evans Academic Center, SCC's Horticulture faculty and students have plans to breathe new life into the landscape by creating a diverse and viable urban forest. With over 25 varieties of trees and a diverse complement of shrubs and ground covers, the plan not only exceeds the City of Spartanburg's landscape requirements but also contributes toward LEED Silver designation.
